

Problem 2: Maximizing an Integral

Let C be the set of all continuous real-valued functions $f : [0, 1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ satisfying

$$|f(x) - f(y)| \leq |x - y|, \quad 0 \leq x, y \leq 1, \quad f(0) = 0.$$

Let $\phi : C \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be defined by $\phi(f) = \int_0^1 (f(x)^2 - f(x))dx$. Show that ϕ attains its maximum at some element of C .

As always, show your work, fully explain and justify your answer. A solution mainly obtained by computers or calculators will not be accepted.
